Biden’s plan to fight inflation is simple: reduce the out-of-control government spending driving up prices. The reason we’ve seen inflation fall by two thirds without losing jobs is because Biden has already passed \$1.7 trillion in deficit reduction, and he has a plan to pass another \$2 trillion. When the government spends less, that brings down prices for everyone.	26%
Biden’s plan to fight inflation is simple: make it cheaper to move goods across the supply chain.
